IOP students are getting out the vote through **UChiVotes** — our student-led, nonpartisan initiative created to boost voter turnout on campus — and our student-led **voter education workshops at Cook County Jail.**

**The Speaker Series** aims to host conversations that hit our students' expressed areas of interest and current developments in the world of politics and public policy.

We began the fall with an examination of the legal woes facing former President Donald Trump that featured former White House attorney Ty Cobb. Setting the stage for the 2024 election cycle, IOP founding Director David Axelrod hosted a conversation featuring The New York Times columnist David French, political analyst David Wasserman, NPR's Susan Davis and political commentator Bakari Sellers.

Other distinguished guests included Illinois Governor JB Pritzker, Michigan Governor Gretchen Whitmer, former U.S. Attorney General Bill Barr, Rockefeller Foundation president Rajiv Shah, author McKay Coppins and former White House aide Cassidy Hutchinson.

Throughout the quarter, Speaker Series events tackled many of the issues facing the nation and world today: from the fight over America's funding of the war in Ukraine, democracy in Africa and recent labor union actions to conversations about anti-trans legislation and the ongoing conflict in Gaza. Student-led event committees explored US-China relations, the prodemocracy movement in Hong Kong and a proposal in Chicago's city council to tax the rich to address homelessness.



#### **Fall Quarter Highlights**

This year, the Civic Engagement team kicked off the vear intentionally focused on connecting students to Chicago. We started the year with a fourday intensive program on social and political issues in Chicago with our **Chicago Bound** cohort. Chicago Bound helps 30 students build civic engagement tools through two service projects with local nonprofits. This year's cohort also met with Pritzker Fellow Che "Rhymefest" Smith. The Civic Engagement team also partnered with UChicago's Center for Effective Government to host two local treks on migrants and the city budget. Each trek was comprised of 20 students with both serving as opportunities for students to learn about Chicago. interact with local journalists, elected leaders, and nonprofit advocates, and find ways to embed themselves in civic and political work.

#### **Civic Engagement Student Groups**

Our student groups enjoyed unprecedented success this fall. **TechTeam**, our student group focused on the intersection of civic engagement and technology, currently has 75 students working on tech-related projects for nonprofits and another 40 students developing programming skills to serve on future projects.

Also, this fall, students volunteering in jails and youth detention centers as part of our **Bridge program**, have recruited more than 40 other students with more expected to join in the winter and spring quarters to scale up the voter education and creative writing workshops they run at Cook County Jail and other detention centers.





"Civic Engagement programming at the IOP this fall has allowed me to focus on voter engagement work as part of UChiVotes. Last year we were focused on the midterms and the municipal elections and we were constantly moving from one election cycle to the next. This fall we're focused on building a robust organizing team going into the 2024 elections and building a coalition of partner organizations to increase registration and voting on campus.

Civic engagement at the IOP has provided a unique opportunity to develop practical political leadership skills. While there are many places across campus where students can acquire knowledge about politics, the IOP Civic Engagement programming is one of the few spaces where I can apply that knowledge to make substantive change. Through IOP civic engagement, I have gained valuable leadership, political organizing, and strategic planning skills. Additionally, being able to see the direct impact my work is having like having a short conversation with someone at a UChiVotes table and seeing them register to vote in front of me, has reinforced my passion for public service, as I can see how even the most minor actions can make a difference."

This past summer, the **Career Development** team placed 300-plus students in public service internships across the country and around the world, including at the U.S. Department of State, with several members of the U.S. Congress. the American **Enterprise Institute**, the Aspen Institute, foreign embassies, the Hoover Institute, the Latino Policy Forum, ABC News and more.

- Students worked with 230 summer internship employer partners in 2023 nationwide and overseas, with more than 100 students working in Chicago and nearly 70 students interning in Washington, D.C.
- This academic year, the IOP will support more than 69
   paid internships in and around Chicago, including
   Chicago Public Media WBEZ, League of Women
   Voters, Chicago Mayor's Office, Chicago Public
   Schools, Consulate General of Mexico, U.S. Department
   of Health and Human Services, Office of U.S. Rep.
   Jonathan Jackson, and the Illinois Policy Institute.
- IOP Career Development staff and interns have hosted multiple career workshops during the fall 2023 academic quarter focused on preparing students to apply for summer internships and enhance their resumes, cover letters, and networking skills. Staff and interns will also have had more than 50 individualized, one-on-one career advising sessions lasting 30 minutes in length with undergraduate and graduate students during the fall 2023 academic quarter.
- The IOP will return to Washington, D.C. for a winter break trek with 25 students to explore career opportunities by engaging with elected officials and staff, journalists, and think tank policy experts.
   Students will also interact with alums and friends of the IOP at a holiday reception in the offices of IOP board member Ed Gillespie.

"I interned for Powered by People, the Texas-based organization founded by former U.S. Congressman Beto O'Rourke. The opportunity emanated from providing research and seminar support to O'Rourke regarding civic participation and mobilizing low-propensity voters during his time as an IOP Pritzker Fellow. The mentorship and research experiences have had a significant impact on my academic and professional journey. Although Powered by People offered a less conventional and structured experience compared to another internship offer I had at Brookings Institution, I feel fortunate to have launched a nonprofit with a former elected official.

My responsibilities involved analyzing direct-to-voter contact data from O'Rourke's 2022 gubernatorial campaign. The resulting report estimated the impact of door-knocking, phone calls, and text messages on voter turnout, ultimately to enhance the effectiveness of future organizing efforts. While studying the Texas political landscape, I found a direct link between the incentive-driven game theories I had studied in the classroom and their real-world applications. These models hypothesize that politicians often prioritize issues that secure their reelection rather than addressing the pressing concerns of young, poor, and minority constituents.

The organization's mission is centered on ensuring that the Texas electorate accurately mirrors the state's population, with young voters, lower-income voters, and voters of color participating at levels proportional to their demographic representation. Equipped with improved quantitative skills, a broad network of connections, a strong professional reference, and a wealth of ideas to address these electoral challenges, I am excited to continue this type of work full-time after graduation."

"Through the IOP, I had the incredible opportunity to serve as a policy and development intern with Life Span – a Chicago-based legal aid organization that helps survivors of domestic violence gain access to counseling, criminal court advocacy, and free or low-cost legal services. I shadowed work by attorneys, court advocates, counselors, and nonprofit board members to gain a deeper understanding of the role that legal advocacy and the nonprofit sector play in the creation of political change on a wider scale.

I worked on a number of important policy initiatives during my time with Life Span. I crafted a policy brief that unpacked the Civilian Office of Police Accountability's handling of officer-involved domestic violence allegations, which I then presented in a meeting held with the City of Chicago Office of the Inspector General. I also did research regarding immigration case law and legal approaches that can be used to help survivors gain legal permanent resident status in the United States. In addition to my policy work, I also worked closely with the director of development to help fund the different services offered by the organization.

I had a very fulfilling internship experience during my summer internship. I learned about the legal realm of our political landscape, and I also got to do hands-on work which helped me develop important career skills. I look forward to continuing my work with Life Span during the academic school year and further improving life for those who face domestic violence in our community."

Brown used the examination of her tenure to show how Oregon was a petri dish for prescriptive policy solutions for the most intractable problems in American life, from urban housing shortages, drug abuse, political extremism, rural-urban divides and criminal justice disparities. With bracing honesty about her own misgivings, failures and achievements, Brown, the "accidental" governor, packed her weekly seminars.

**Stephanie Murphy**Former U.S. Representative (D-FL)

Murphy, a refugee from Vietnam raised in a trailer park in rural Virginia, used her seminars to make the case that the two pillars that make America great are its governance system of democracy and its economic system of capitalism. Murphy explored the changing dynamics of the American electorate and took students through a rigorous tour of American policies around infrastructure, China, ESG and more.

#### **Former Republican Governor of Maryland**

Hogan explained how he navigated partisan dysfunction and incivility that has stained politics nationally and in other states. Throughout his time on campus, he worked with both Republican and Democrat student organizations to help them find paths toward more civil disagreement.



**Chase Strangio** 

#### **Deputy Director for Transgender Justice with the American Civil Liberties Union**

With debates over rights for transgender people engulfing the nation, Strangio, a lead lawyer at the center of the most high-profile battles and the leading architect of challenges to bills governing restrooms, sports, and health care, oriented students around the history of trans rights, trans bodies and trans justice and the cultural and political background of this moment.



"The IOP serves as an educational opportunity outside of the classroom, permitting me to practice and explore the political concepts I learn in the classroom. Every day, I rediscover my hope and faith in politics by hearing from world-renowned political practitioners and experts while learning what new policies and issues my attention should be directed toward. During a recent seminar with Jeff Larson, he touched on the role of media in the conventions and primary process for presidential elections. Long having been concerned about the rise of social media and the disinformation propagated through this medium, I was pleasantly surprised to hear Jeff and his guest, Rick Klein of ABC News, speak to the steps news organizations take to ensure the media is a source of truth. This conversation was the reassurance of the value of media platforms and the presence of people throughout that industry seeking to do good things in politics. That hope is something I have only been able to cultivate here at the IOP.

I love working on the Fellows Program because of the mentorship available to ambassadors and team leaders. Getting to regularly interact with the Fellows, I have taken advantage of the unique opportunities to ask them about career, professional, and personal advice. For example, in my second year when I was applying for legal and financerelated internships. I was struggling to personally answer the question of what my plans post-college were. So, at dinner with Robin Rue-Simmons, I asked her about her professional journey and what guided her in deciding to start as a real-estate business owner and switch to serving in government. Hearing from her about her success in switching between industries years into her career assuaged my concerns about feeling behind my peers if I switched fields later in life. Because of her and her thoughtprovoking advice. I have settled on my immediate career plans and grown comfortable with the uncertainty that accompanies my professional life."

### Affordable Housing Policy Challenge

Twice a year, the Institute of Politics challenges students to propose solutions to major policy puzzles that vex local, national, and global leaders. This fall, we asked students to tackle **the affordable housing crisis** across America. In total, **43 students across 12 teams participated**. The students came from all corners of campus including from The College, the Harris School of Public Policy and even the Divinity School participated.

In the making of their proposals, teams met with an array of professional practitioners from within the housing sector.

After an exciting first round, three teams were selected to move to the final round. A team from Harris calling themselves, "N.O.A.H.'s Ark" sought to increase the development of affordable housing and work to maintain the current supply of affordable units. "Streamlining Santa Cruz," a team of three students from the College, called for the restructuring of the bureaucratic apparatus within the Santa Department of Economic Housing and Development. The final team, "ADUnlock: Accelerating ADU Access," was made up of two College students and two Harris Students. This team recommended establishing a federal program which allows states to access grants. conditional on the removal of barriers to constructing additional dwelling units (ADUs) in those states.

The winning team, whose proposal was ADUnlock and consisted of Emma Janssen (The College '24), Tiffany Li (The College '26), Jane Jingyi Ma (Harris '25) and Beiqi Shi ('25), won \$500 each and will have a chance to present their proposal to a group of housing experts.
