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WELCOME A note from the Institute Director

Dear Members of the Board of Advisors:

I am deeply grateful that you accepted my invitation to be a part of the Board of Advisors to the University of Chicago's Institute of Politics. On April 7-8, 2013, many of you will be joining us in Chicago for our first advisory board meeting. I look forward to bringing you up to date on our exciting first quarter and introducing you to our extraordinary staff and Student Advisory Council.

As you know, the Institute officially opened in January 2013, and we hit the ground running in all areas of programming. In the wake of the New-



town, Conn., tragedy, we began our **Speaker Series** with a powerful and evocative panel on "The Politics of Guns in America," moderated by Tom Brokaw. We then shifted to our core Winter Quarter 2013 program, entitled "Full Access: Inside the Obama & Romney Campaigns." The "Full Access" series, which spanned six weeks, really resonated with the UChicago student community. Highlights included: "A Conversation with Newt Gingrich" on Feb. 19, where I interviewed the former Speaker; a Saturday afternoon symposium entitled "High-Tech and Highly Targeted: Inside the Obama Campaign's Digital War Room," featuring a keynote at lunch by Board of Advisors member David Plouffe; and a March 7 conversation with Gov. Jon Huntsman. Additionally, throughout the Winter Quarter, the Institute hosted an array of dynamic speakers including Secretary Madeleine Albright and California Gov. Jerry Brown.

We used the "Full Access" series as an opportunity to creatively and deliberately launch our **Fellows Program**. Instead of having Fellows in residence for the entire Winter Quarter, we had strategists and journalists involved in the 2012 election reside in Chicago with an office at the Institute House for a week at a time. These Fellows led multiple small group seminars, participated in the week's larger Speaker Series panels, held office hours, and otherwise engaged in the University and Chicago community. Our first Fellow, Beth Myers, was such a hit that, by popular demand, we asked her to join our Board of Advisors, and we're pleased that she accepted.

We have also made great headway in terms of our **Internship and Student Civic Engagement Program**. We began with an ambitious goal of funding 50 summer internships for 2013 and have exceeded that mark. In Chicago, Washington and New York, where we will have a large number of UChicago student interns, we have also arranged programming to allow them to interact

and learn from alumni and others in various political and policy positions. In addition to the summer internships, some of our students have participated in internship opportunities in Chicago aldermanic offices and at the Republican and Democratic National Conventions.

Students, and the entire University community, can look forward to additional stimulating programming in the Spring Quarter. You will see in your BOA materials a preview of our Spring Quarter events. We kick off our Speakers Series on April 8 with a panel entitled "What's Next for the Republican Party?"—moderated by Chris Wallace and featuring Gov. Haley Barbour, Ramesh Ponnuru and Board members Bill Kristol, Mike Murphy and Beth Myers.

We will also host timely panels on political issues ranging from budget brinksmanship to immigration to climate change, as well as programs with luminaries such as Nobel Peace Prize laureate Elie Wiesel; Pulitzer Prize-winning author and human rights activist Samantha Power; and Cass Sunstein, the noted legal scholar and author who served as President Obama's regulatory chief.

We are also excited to welcome this spring a compelling roster of Resident and Visiting fellows including Haley Barbour; former senator and presidential candidate Gary Hart; Jon Favreau, who recently stepped down after eight years as chief speechwriter for President Obama; former Rep. Steve LaTourette, who recently retired after nine terms in the House; Chris Lu, who served as Cabinet secretary from 2009 until this year; and Bethany McLean, a contributing editor to Vanity Fair and co-author of "All the Devils Are Here" and "The Smartest Guys in the Room: The Amazing Rise and Scandalous Fall of Enron." Each will conduct weekly study groups and participate in other programs with our students.

We look forward to sharing more with you about our operation, our mission and our goals. But most important, we are eager for your advice and input on ways in which we can make our programs even stronger. We have every expectation that we will soon see students who have come through the Institute of Politics' doors making a difference in the political and policy arenas of our cities, states, country and world. To us, that will be success, and your expertise and guidance will be critical to that success.

MISSION

Who we are and what we do

The Institute of Politics at the University of Chicago is an extracurricular program designed to nurture in young people a passion for politics and public service.

The nonpartisan IOP gives students an extraordinary chance to interact with a wide array of practitioners across the political spectrum. We also facilitate high-level internships in Washington, state capitals, local governments, media outlets and policy groups, to expose young people to opportunities in the public sphere.

The Institute, housed in a newly renovated building near the heart of the University campus, is open to both graduate and undergraduate students, but with a special emphasis on college students considering career options.

Three sections form the core of the Institute's programming: (1) the hosting of Fellows—operatives, policymakers, journalists and others—who will design, and engage with students, in weekly study groups that draw on their experiences; (2) an extensive paid internship program based on the University of Chicago's innovative Jeff Metcalf Fellows Program; and (3) a wide-ranging Speakers Series of lectures and panel discussions on issues in politics, media and public policy.

We also promote a spirit of civic engagement among our students, encouraging them to identify activities of their own through which they can have an impact.

The Institute's inaugural director is David Axelrod, former senior advisor to President Obama and a 35-year veteran of American politics and journalism.



THE UNIVERSITY OF CHICAGO

The University of Chicago is one of the great academic and research institutions in the country, with more Nobel laureates (85) associated with it than any other university in the world. The university is also home to hundreds of MacArthur Fellows, Rhodes Scholars, and recipients of the Presidential Medal of Freedom. Notable alumni include Milton Friedman, Katharine Graham, Kurt Vonnegut, Susan Sontag and Carl Sagan.

The school also has a long tradition of diversity of political thought, embracing innovative thinkers with an array of political viewpoints. The University has given rise to some of the most noted political leaders and thinkers of the last century. The list of alumni and former faculty members includes President Barack Obama, Sen. Paul Douglas, Sen. Carol Moseley Braun, Sen. Charles Percy, Sen. Amy Klobuchar, U.S. Attorney General Edward Levi, U.S. Attorney General John Ashcroft, and U.S. Secretary of State George Shultz.

Alumni of the University also have made prominent contributions to public service journalism, including Washington Post Pulitzer Prizewinning columnist David Broder; New York Times columnist and Board of Advisors member David Brooks; Pulitzer Prize-winning investigative journalist Daniel Gilbert; Pulitzer Prize-winning investigative journalist Seymour Hersh; New York Times editorial board member Brent Staples; and Pulitzer Prize-winning Chicago writer Studs Terkel.

BOARD OF ADVISORS

The Board of Advisors to the Institute of Politics includes a diverse group of leaders in civic life, politics, business and journalism.

The principal responsibility of board members will be to attend one-day, bi-annual meetings to review the Institute's program and activities. In addition we would ask our board members' assistance in four other areas:

- recruiting of Fellows
- arrangement of rewarding internship opportunities
- outreach to elected and government officials, political operatives, journalists and others to participate in our Speaker Series and other Institute-sponsored events

Members have no fiduciary duty, and they serve on a volunteer basis in an advisory capacity to the Institute Director and staff.


The bi-annual meetings will take place in Chicago, in the spring and late fall. Board members are appointed to an initial three-year term, which is renewable upon mutual agreement.

DAVID AXELROD, AB'76

Institute Director

A University of Chicago alumnus, David Axelrod is a 35-year veteran of American politics and journalism. Prior to becoming a political consultant, Axelrod spent eight years as a reporter and columnist for the Chicago Tribune, including a stint as the City Hall bureau chief. As a political consultant, Axelrod has managed media and communications strategy for more than 150 local, state and national campaigns. Axelrod most recently served as senior strategist to President Obama's successful re-election campaign. He served in that same role in then-Senator Obama's 2008 presidential campaign, before going on to serve in the White House as senior advisor to the president. After the 2012 campaign, Axelrod turned his focus to the Institute of Politics to help inspire and train the next generation of leaders.



DARREN REISBERG

Executive Director

Darren Reisberg has served as Executive Director of the Institute of Politics since June 2012. Prior to that, and since 2005, Darren worked at the Illinois State Board of Education, most recently as General Counsel and Deputy Superintendent. In those roles, Darren counseled the State Superintendent of Education and State Board of Education on legal, policy and operational matters. Before joining the Illinois State Board of Education, Darren was an employment and labor attorney for four years at the Chicago law firm Sidley Austin LLP. He also worked as a judicial law clerk for U.S. District Court Judge Rebecca R. Pallmeyer, JD'79. Originally from New Jersey, Darren received his JD from Yale Law School and earned his BA in political science at Duke University.



STEVE EDWARDS

Deputy Director, Programming

For more than two decades, Steve Edwards has covered politics and public policy as a journalist and program host. His work has appeared on the BBC, Bloomberg News, PBS, and on numerous public radio stations around the United States. Most recently, he spent nearly 14 years at WBEZ, Chicago's NPR member station, where he served as host of the acclaimed daily shows The Afternoon Shift and Eight Forty-Eight. Steve has moderated numerous candidate debates, hosted the weekly political show The Best Game in Town, and was the correspondent for a BBC documentary on Chicago's political culture. A native of Kansas City, he was a Knight-Wallace Fellow at the University of Michigan and earned his A.B. in political science from Amherst College.



JAN KOSTNER

Deputy Director, Events and Marketing

Prior to joining the Institute, Jan Kostner served as the Director of Illinois Office of Tourism (IOT), where she spearheaded the state's tourism industry marketing and development efforts. In 2011, through her leadership, tourism expenditures in Illinois returned to pre-recession levels of \$29 billion. She led the Illinois hospitality industry to successfully advocate for the passage of the Travel Promotion Act of 2009, which created BrandUSA, the country's tourism marketing arm to the international community. Kostner also oversaw IOT's \$25 million grant program, to assist Illinois organizations and communities each year in marketing their areas. Prior to joining IOT, Kostner was a senior vice president for Chicago-based public affairs and strategic communications firm Jasculca/Terman, where she was responsible for strategic planning, new client development and company marketing. SPEAKER SERIES & SPECIAL GUESTS

The Institute of Politics brings to the University of Chicago dynamic events every academic quarter, providing a forum for policymakers and other political actors to share their wealth of experience with the University community and the public. During Winter Quarter 2013, our inaugural series featured 69 guest speakers across 20 events attended by more than 4,000 people, in settings ranging from small seminars to sold-out auditoriums. Several sessions generated major local and national television coverage, such as broadcasts on MSNBC and C-SPAN.



WINTER QUARTER 2013 HIGHLIGHTS

FULL ACCESS 2012

In the Winter Quarter of 2013, the Institute of Politics embarked on an unprecedented six-week analysis of the 2012 presidential election through a series of major public panels, interviews and seminars. We devoted each week to a different campaign-related theme and organized public programs and seminars around it:

• Week 1: Top advisors from each campaign discussed campaign strategy and debate preparation. Speakers included David Axelrod, Eric Fehrnstrom, Larry Grisolano, Jim Messina, Beth Myers and Stuart Stevens.

• Week 2: Obama pollster and Institute Fellow Joel Benenson, Romney pollster Neil Newhouse, Obama researcher David Binder and GOP pollster Bill McInturff were among the experts who explored the art and science of public opinion and discussed the issue of public polling.

• Week 3: We explored the topics of voter targeting and digital strategy with panels such as "High-Tech and Highly Targeted: Inside the Obama Campaign's Digital War Room" and "Mobilizing Coalitions: Understanding the Emerging Electorate." Speakers included Obama campaign manager and Board member David Plouffe, Republican pollster Whit Ayres and Obama Chief Technology Officer Harper Reed.

• Week 4: Panels such as "Ads, Messaging and Media Buying in 2012" and "Media Relations in the Digital Age" took an in-depth look at TV commercials, social media and press coverage during a campaign. Guests included Obama Deputy Campaign Manager and Board member Stephanie Cutter, Romney senior advisor Kevin Madden, and New York Times political correspondent Jim Rutenberg.

• Week 5: The Institute examined the topic of campaign financing with events like "The Role of Super PACs in 2012 & Beyond" and "Inside the World of Campaign Fundraising." Julianna Smoot, deputy campaign manager for Obama for America; Spencer Zwick, co-founder of Solamere Capital and advisor for Romney for President; Crossroads GPS CEO Steven Law; and Priorities USA Action co-founder Sean Sweeney were among our panelists.



• Week 6: We wrapped up the "Full Access 2012" series with a reporters roundtable titled, "Looking Back & Looking Forward: Lessons of the 2012 Campaign." The panel included National Journal's Ronald Brownstein (also an Institute Fellow), Bloomberg's Julianna Goldman, POLITICO's Jonathan Martin, and then-New York Times national political correspondent Jeff Zeleny.

A CONVERSATION WITH...

In addition to our deep dive into the 2012 campaign, the Institute of Politics hosted guests such as former House Speaker Newt Gingrich and former U.S. Ambassador Jon Huntsman. Gingrich was interviewed by Axelrod in a candid conversation about his career, his presidential run and gridlock in Washington. Huntsman, who sat down with Fox News political analyst and Institute Fellow Juan Williams, discussed U.S.-China relations, the state of American politics and the future of the GOP.

THE POLITICS OF GUNS IN AMERICA

In the wake of the tragedy in Newtown, Conn., the Institute responded with a powerful and timely conversation about gun legislation that featured Chicago Mayor Rahm Emanuel, Rep. Steve LaTourette, UChicago Crime Lab Director Jens Ludwig, Chicago Tribune columnist Steve Chapman, and moderator Tom Brokaw of NBC.

WASHINGTON, D.C., KICKOFF EVENT

In advance of the presidential inauguration, we convened key thought leaders for a panel discussion that looked ahead to President Obama's second term, the new Congress and the prospects for movement on a range of public policy issues. Panelists included NBC's David Gregory, New York Times columnist and Board member David Brooks, Sen. Lindsey Graham, Chicago Mayor Rahm Emanuel, and Sen. Claire McCaskill. In the second portion of the afternoon event, Republican strategist Ed Gillespie joined David Axelrod for an insider's view of the 2012 campaign in a conversation moderated by CNN's Candy Crowley.

SPEAKER SERIES: LOOKING FORWARD



2012-2013 GOALS

HOUSING


As the Institute of Politics moves towards a full cohort of Fellows-in-Residence next quarter, appropriate housing is still being determined. 2013-2014 FELLOWS APPLICATION PROCESS

The IOP will secure 10 Fellows-in-Residence for the 2013-2014 academic calendar year—five for autumn 2013 and five for spring 2014. The Fellows application and review process will include: application submission, initial screening for completion, application review, finalist interviews and offers of acceptance. An Application Review Committee (ARC)—composed of students, faculty, IOP staff and Advisory Committee Board members—will evaluate all complete applications and select finalists for interviews. ARC will also conduct interviews with finalists and make final recommendations to the Institute Director.

FELLOWS AMBASSADORS

Through the Fellows Ambassador program, students apply to serve as assistants to the Fellows, attending their events and study groups; being a liaison between the Fellows and the University community; and helping to orient them to the campus, the Hyde Park neighborhood and the city of Chicago.



INTERNSHIP PROGRAM

The Institute of Politics introduces students to careers in electoral politics. government, public policy and journalism. With internships throughout the academic year and in the summer, students are given unique and substantive opportunities in public service.

ACADEMIC YEAR INTERNSHIPS

During the school year, students have the opportunity to engage hands on in significant local government and policy internships.

Aldermanic Internship Program

Throughout the academic year, students gain invaluable first-hand insight into the workings of local government and its intersection with neighborhood and community development efforts. The Institute of Politics also provides UChicago Aldermanic Interns with programming opportunities to meet and learn from fellow interns, local government officials and alumni. Students intern in the city's 3rd, 4th, 5th, 20th, 22nd, 32nd and 43rd Wards.

Policy Internships

In partnership with Chicago-based government, research and advocacy organizations, students learn about crucial policy concerns, such as crime and immigration, and provide research and writing assistance during substantive internships. Partners include the UChicago Crime and Urban Education Lab, the Young Center for Immigrant Children's Rights and the Chicago Police Department.

SUMMER INTERNSHIPS

Working alongside the University of Chicago's successful Metcalf program, the Institute will be offering nearly 100 new summer internships in the amount of \$4,000 each, so that undergraduate students can take advantage of these opportunities to explore and engage in public and social service. From legislative offices to think-tanks to news agencies, students will have the chance to intern at a variety of organizations this summer. Below is a by-the-numbers look at our 2013 highlights. STUDENT CIVIC ENGAGEMENT

The Institute of Politics is committed to involving students in the world beyond the classroom by giving them the opportunities and tools to connect and contribute to their neighborhood, their city, and their country.

TRIPS & EXPERIENCES

The Institute creates opportunities for students to leave campus for visits with policymakers, political practitioners, journalists and other players in the public arena. In the past six months, more than 150 students have participated in the following civic engagement trips and experiences:



President Obama at Hyde Park Academy: Five students attended the president's talk at a local high school about gun violence and had the chance to meet him.

Republican and Democratic National Conventions: Twelve students interned at the RNC and DNC, helping POLITICO produce events and content during and assisting the Convention Committees with their operational and administrative needs.

Chicago Tribune Editorial Board: Five students attended a Chicago Tribune Editorial Board meeting to observe a conversation about the paper's political endorsements and to learn how influential journalists make decisions about the candidates they endorse.

Sonia Sotomayor: A group of students met Supreme Court Justice Sonia Sotomayor and heard her discuss her new book about her rise from poverty to become the first Latina in the Supreme Court.

Chicago Ideas Week: Seven students attended a Chicago Ideas Week session featuring City of Chicago Mayor Rahm Emanuel to learn about the city's focus on innovation.

Election Judges: Twenty students served as Election Judges in Chicago's 32nd Ward. They attended a training before election day and devoted 16 hours on Nov. 6, 2012, to helping Chicagoans vote in the national election.

WBEZ/Civic Reflection Project: Seven students attended a conversation at WBEZ, the local NPR affiliate, about a politically-themed poem. They engaged in a discussion with other students

from Chicago about what the election and political engagement means for them. The conversation was recorded and made available on WBEZ's website.

Illinois Legislative Lame Duck Session: Seven students traveled to Springfield, Ill., in January 2013 to attend meetings with Republican and Democratic State Senators, agency heads and lobbyists, and to watch the political process in action.

IOP Kick-off in Washington, D.C.: Four students attended the D.C.-based launch event for the Institute of Politics and toured the Pentagon, the CIA and the U.S. Capitol.

Chicago City Council Visit: Fifty students attended a City Council meeting to see our local government in action, hear from Alderman and UChicago alum Will Burns, and meet with Mayor Rahm Emanuel.

National Campaign Conference: Two students represented UChicago at the National Campaign Conference, where 23 schools across the country convene to discuss political engagement on their campuses.

Conservative Political Action Conference (CPAC): Institute staff took three students to D.C. to attend the conservative convention and hear from various prominent political figures.

Spring Break 2013 Trip to D.C.: Twenty students attended meetings with alumni in public service to learn about their work and their career paths. Visits included the State Department, Human Rights Watch, the Brookings Institution and the Executive Office of the President.

STUDENT CIVIC ENGAGEMENT

CONVERSATIONS & SPECIAL EVENTS

Students have the opportunity to hear from seasoned political figures, prominent policymakers and journalists in smaller group settings. In these sessions, students are able to ask any questions they would like and often learn many off-the-record tips from these well-respected practitioners. Almost 250 students have participated in these conversations to date.

Madeleine Albright: Twenty-five women had the opportunity to be part of a candid conversation about Albright's career and her role as the first female Secretary of State.

Jerry Brown: Eighty students attended a breakfast chat with the California governor, who answered all of their questions about his long political career.

Newt Gingrich: Forty College Republicans met in a smallgroup setting with former Speaker of the House Newt Gingrich. He responded to all the students' questions and shed light on his experience as a presidential candidate.

Michael Bloomberg: Thirty students attended an event at which the New York mayor was interviewed by former Secretary of the Treasury Hank Paulson. Bloomberg discussed



his extensive career in business and politics and talked about his approach to the challenges of crime and public safety.

David Wasserman: Seventy students heard from The Cook Political Report journalist, who was able to name candidates and projections for any of the 435 congressional districts.



ONGOING PROJECTS

From immigration to educational policy, these student-driven projects offer participants the opportnity to explore a particular issue in the long-term, through both discussion and action in the surrounding community.

Citizenship Project: In partnership with the Illinois Coalition for Immigrant and Refugee Rights, UChicago students help tutor community members to prepare for the U.S. Citizenship exam. Students also have the opportunity to meet with and discuss the broader U.S. immigration policy debate with experts in the field of immigration policy.

Chicago Public Schools mentoring:

Once a week, UChicago students spend 90 minutes at two middle schools in Chicago's Back of the Yards and Pilsen neighborhoods, teaching students about politics and campaigns with a new "Run for Office" curriculum that teaches how to outline a platform, write speeches, finance campaigns and more. UChicago Policy Congress: Undergraduate and graduate students from various majors and professional schools partner to plan a series of policy forums—on topics ranging from health care to education reform to safety—for Chicago's South Side high school students. Students then convene a day-long congress to discuss and vote on the policy solutions.

STUDENT ADVISORY COUNCIL

The Institute of Politics Student Advisory Council is the leading body of the IOP Student Association, which encompasses the various opportunities for student engagement that the Institute provides. The SAC has an independent and autonomous budget, a healthy contingent of campus leaders and plenty of ideas. As the IOP moves forward into the spring and the next academic year, the Student Advisory Council will look to lead campus involvement and participation. The SAC has four committees, each corresponding to a larger Student Association committee of the same category. The committees are as follows:

Chairs Committee/ **UChicago Political Review** and UChicago Political Union

The SAC Chairs oversee the UChicago Political Union and the Political Review. The Union, which launched in January, has a consistent attendance of 40 students. The Political Review. which was started by two SAC members has a healthy staff of 74 students and is planning a soft launch in the Spring, with a full launch coming in autumn 2013.

Events Committee/ Ambassadors

This committee oversaw the logistics and programming side of IOP events this past year, managing student volunteers as well as assisting with programming ideas. Moving forward the Committee will be tasked with developing programming that the SAC and Student Association initiate independently in addition to the staff events.

Fellows Committee/ Ambassadors

This committee has worked over this past year to establish the systems and processes by which Fellows Ambassadors are selected, as well as to work in concert with the Institute of Politics staff to bring Fellows to campus. The Student Advisory Council members have also been part of the Fellow Ambassadors Selection Committee.

Student Civic Engagement Committee/Ambassadors

This committee has launched two self-initiated projects, both of which have been great successes: the Citizens Schools teaching opportunity, in which students teach electoral politics in local schools, and an immigration tutoring initiative on campus that helps non-citizens at UChicago and in the community pass the naturalization examination.
